Notes from the Bishop

“The Church should stay out of politics and stick to the Gospel!” I would guess that most of us have either heard or said words to this effect over the years. While this sentiment isn’t new, it has taken on new energy in the current social and political environment, as polarization and conflict seem to be on the rise even as many of our congregations are struggling to regain their footing after the pandemic. It’s understandable that folks may want their congregations, their pastors, and their bishop to avoid anything that might be considered controversial or divisive.

If you have thoughts on this topic, I encourage you to participate in the upcoming dialogue that will take place as the ELCA develops a social statement on Civic Life and Faith, the relationship of church and state and related matters, as called for by the 2019 ELCA

Churchwide Assembly (for more information: www.elca.org/Faith/Faith-and-Society/Social-Messages/Government). This process includes a six-week study guide, and there is a participant feedback period that runs through October 15. The first draft of the social statement will be distributed in December, and draft comment and hearing period will run through October of 2024. The final draft will then be released in early 2025 for consideration at synod assemblies in the spring of 2025 and at the Churchwide Assembly in August 2025.

Here are a few of my core convictions that I hope will be reflected in the final statement:

- The church is called to be political. My definition of the word political derives from the Greek word from which it comes, polis, which simply refers to our lives lived in the public arena. I believe that God cares deeply about how we treat one another in the public arena and wants us to work for policies and laws that promote the health and well-being of all of God’s children. Just as Jesus fed the hungry and healed the sick, God wants us to express love for our neighbors, not just in thoughts and prayers, but in concrete actions that tend to their physical, emotional, and spiritual needs.
- The church is called to avoid partisan politics. Individual Christians are certainly called to engage in the political process, voting, campaigning, and even serving as elected officials, but the church (congregations, pastors, deacons, and bishops) need to avoid being closely identified with any particular politician or political party. While the church and its leaders can and should advocate for budgets and laws that help society care for creation and all its inhabitants, we recognize that the political process is human and flawed, and we all stand in need of correction and admonition.

- The church is called to embrace disagreement and conflict. Simply put, life is complicated, and if the answers to the many challenges and conflicts of our common life were obvious and easy, we would have fixed things long ago. Thoughtful, faithful people who have different life experiences and priorities may disagree on *how* to create a society that respects human dignity and enhances the life and well-being of all. *That* we are called to love and serve our neighbors, however, is not up for debate.

Through it all, I hope we continue to be guided by a scripture passage that has shaped much of how I live and lead, recorded in Micah 6:8: “what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?” This compels us to engage in the civic arena and to do so with humility and love as we see justice for the whole creation.

Storytelling is a powerful tool that can be used to connect with people on a deep level. It can help us to share our experiences, learn from each other, and build relationships. When we tell our stories, we are inviting others into our lives and giving them a glimpse of who we are. We are also giving them the opportunity to connect with us on a personal level. By making and creating spaces where people from all backgrounds can feel safe, accepted, and included, we can help to promote authentic inclusion in our churches and communities.

Dr. Kelly Sherman-Conroy— Mato Wašté Winyan, or Good Bear Woman —is a member of the Oglala Lakota Nation. She has a passion for social justice, racial reparations, healing, and storytelling that has been felt across the globe. As the very first Native Woman Theologian with a PhD in the ELCA, she’s passionately pursued her calling to challenge the traditional conventions of theology. Her work primarily focuses on systemic theology, with a unique approach to Lakota Spirituality and how it can inform Christianity and instill healing. Kelly’s ability to speak the truth in love from a Native perspective coupled with her humility and humor makes for a powerful reception of truth in the hearts of Natives and non-Natives alike.
