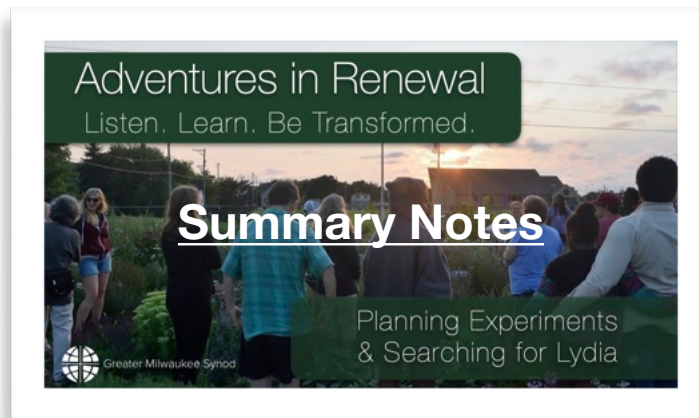




1. We started by reviewing the learnings from all our listening activities to this point, because **listening is central to all of this work.**
What has God revealed to your team through Dwelling in the Word, the “Listening to One Another’s Stories” and “Naming God’s Activity” exercises?
2. We named that this work is essentially listening-based evangelism, and that **the shift from hosting everything to being hosted** sends powerful messages to our neighbors that:
 - a. **We are all in this together.**
 - b. **God’s love, mercy & grace are for them, too.**
3. We talked about how to plan action-learning experiments, and that the success of our experiments is measured **by how much we are transformed, not by how much impact we have on others.**
4. We named that in the work of church renewal, **the first hearts God needs to change are ours.**
5. As we laid out how to plan an experiment, we highlighted the importance of...
 - a. Naming what you hope to learn
 - b. Connecting that to your listening work that’s happened so far.
6. We talked about how important it is to be detailed in your planning of the experiment, to make it easier for your team to invite others to participate with you, and how important that is.
7. Your team’s impact will only stay within your team if you aren’t **regularly inviting people from the congregation to participate** in these experiments, and **regularly sharing your group’s learnings back** with the whole congregation.
8. We gave a few examples, like the purple bus and the community meal experiments, so you begin to get a sense of how to really get the learning out of any experiment you do.
9. We named **the difference between “listening to fix” and “listening to build relationships,”** and how this process of renewal is meant to keep nudging us toward the relationships.
10. There are many resources posted with this video, including lots of starter ideas for experiments.
11. We know it may be helpful to re-watch this video every so often, because this model of **listening to learn and to build relationships** is new for many of us.
